To accomplish these goals, local and national governments around the world must join forces and share the outcomes of their efforts based on citizen involvement. In accordance with the UN's recommendations, Hwaseong City has published this Voluntary Local Review (VLR) to share its progress and achievements in sustainable development with the international society.

Back in 2001 when Hwaseong was elevated to the status of city, it was a small urban area with a population of 210,000. From January 1, 2025, it will make another new start as "Hwaseong Special City" with a population of 1.03 million. Such remarkable growth would not have been possible without the help and support of citizens who have taken the lead with a focus on harmony, co-existence, solidarity and cooperation, attaining sustainable development amid the development of new towns and advanced industries.

Together with its citizens, Hwaseong has developed and implemented "Hwaseong Sustainable Development Goals (HS-SDGs), consisting of 4 strategies and 17 goals based on its vision "Hwaseong, a city where everyone can enjoy a life of equality in harmony with nature" under public-private governance, to ensure a safe and happy life for future generations in cooperation with the Hwaseong Sustainable Development Council.

Connection with the Universal Sustainable Development Goals

The Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) adopted by the UN in 2015 are shared goals for humanity to achieve by 2030. In line with this global agenda, in 2020, Hwaseong devised its own version of the Sustainable Development Goals (HS-SDGs).

The HS-SDGs include specific targets and indicators aligned with local circumstances, addressing Hwaseong's unique characteristics and the views of its citizens.

Creating a Sustainable City based on Citizen Involvement

In the process of creating the HS-SDGs, Hwaseong employed a democratic and transparent decision-making process by collecting opinions from various stakeholders, including citizens, the administration, relevant organizations and institutes, and experts.

This SDGs process has served as an opportunity for all the stakeholders involved to learn and grow together while exploring common values, becoming proactive leaders who contribute to the regional community.

Introducing the City of Hwaseong

Hwaseong, located at the southwestern part of Gyeonggi Province in South Korea, is a vibrant city with a population exceeding one million, which has paved the way for its designation as a special city. Under Korea's local government model, a special city refers to a large city¹⁾ that has grown through countless efforts and devotion. It has grown into a diverse and well-balanced city, featuring advanced industries to the east, marine tourism to the west, an industrial foundation and residential complexes to the south and agriculture and nature to the north.

With an influx of younger generations, Hwaseong has fostered a dynamic and energetic urban atmosphere. In particular, the development of Dongtan New Town has attracted many young residents, lowering the city's average age to below the national average, and has created a multicultural society through the migration of foreign workers. Furthermore, outstanding education facilities and various training programs have raised Hwaseong's status as an educational city. The city also has engaged in inclusive welfare policies to ensure that all citizens can enjoy a happy life.

As an innovative city leading the future, it has actively fostered core strategic industries such as future vehicles, semiconductors and biotechnology, all built upon its solid industrial foundation. Moreover, Hwaseong ranked first in the supply of renewable energy in the 2023 Gyeonggi Province Comprehensive Evaluation of Cities and Counties, establishing its status as an eco-friendly city.

In harmony with nature and humanity, Hwaseong has developed various marine recreational attractions, leveraging the stunning natural landscapes of the west coast while protecting its diverse ecological environments,

such as Hwaseongho Lake and Maehyangri Tidal Flats. It has also strived to become an ecological city by transforming itself into a vast botanic garden spanning across the city, where citizens can engage with plants and appreciate the significance of nature.

Hwaseong is indeed a dynamic city that has seen development across various sectors, including industries, the environment and education. It has further evolved into a leading sustainable city in South Korea, helping to make citizens' dreams come true and improve their quality of life.

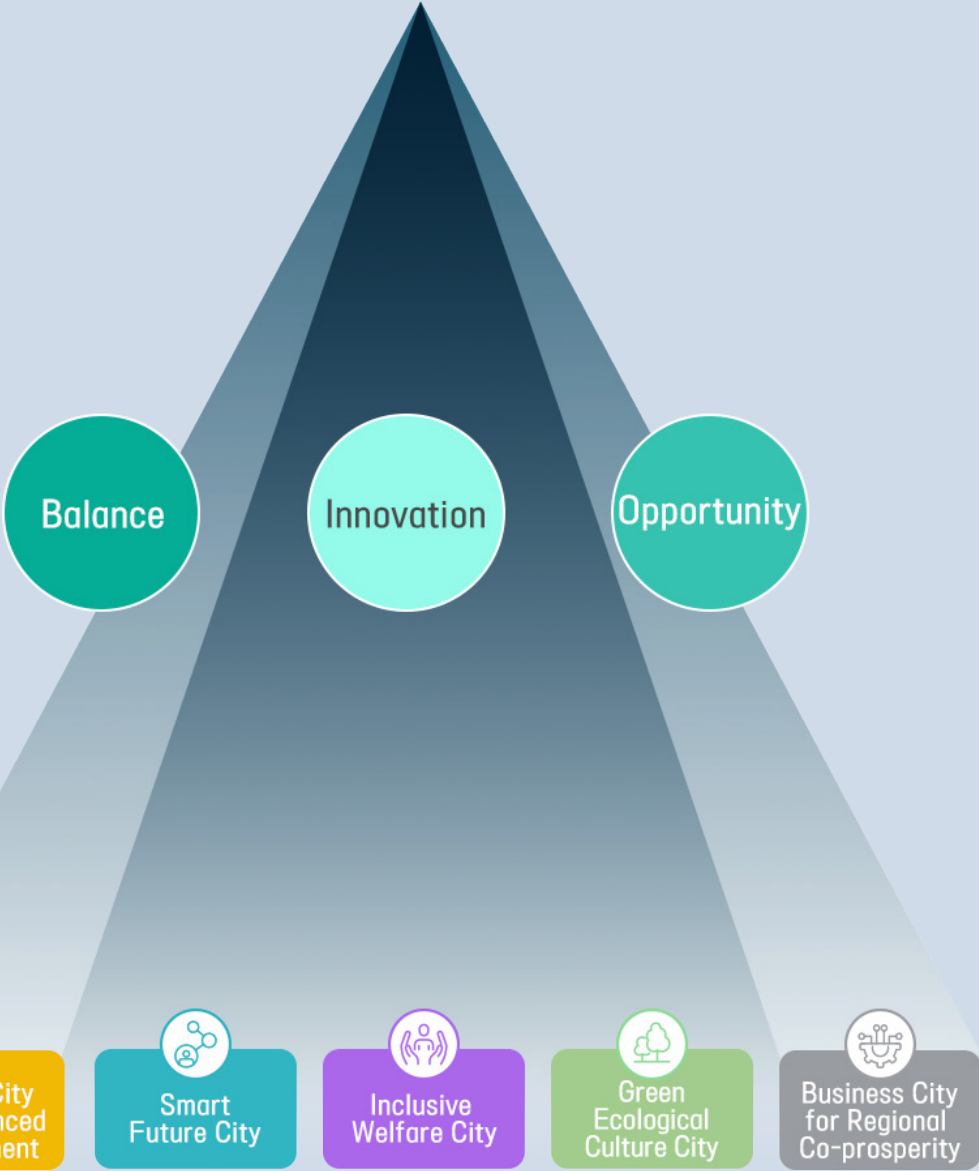

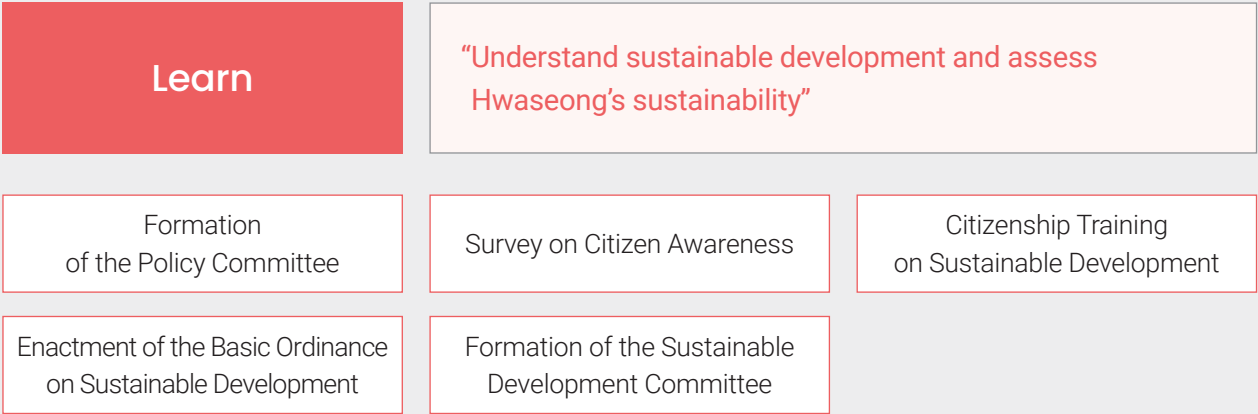


Setting HS-SDGs

※ Policy Committee on the HS-SDGs (May to Dec 2019)

- The Policy Committee was organized to establish a cooperative framework for Hwaseong's Sustainable Development Goals.

- It carried out the analysis of basic data, training and workshops (five sessions in total).

※ Diagnosis of Sustainability (May to Dec 2019)

- The fundamental research was to devise Hwaseong's Sustainable Development Goals, followed by the preparation of reports.

- Citizens and public servants were surveyed and findings were analyzed to be used as basic data.

- Hwaseong's sustainable development was forecast.



※ Hwaseong Sustainable Development Academy 'Arcade for Hwaseong Citizens' (Aug to Oct 2019)

- Capacity-building training was conducted for citizens concerned about directions of Hwaseong's sustainable development to enhance their understanding of sustainable development.

- The Academy refers to a classroom that connects with the future under the five pillars of the SDGs (people, prosperity, planet, partnership and peace), offering engaging education in an easy and fun way, tailored to the needs of citizens by sector, class and region.



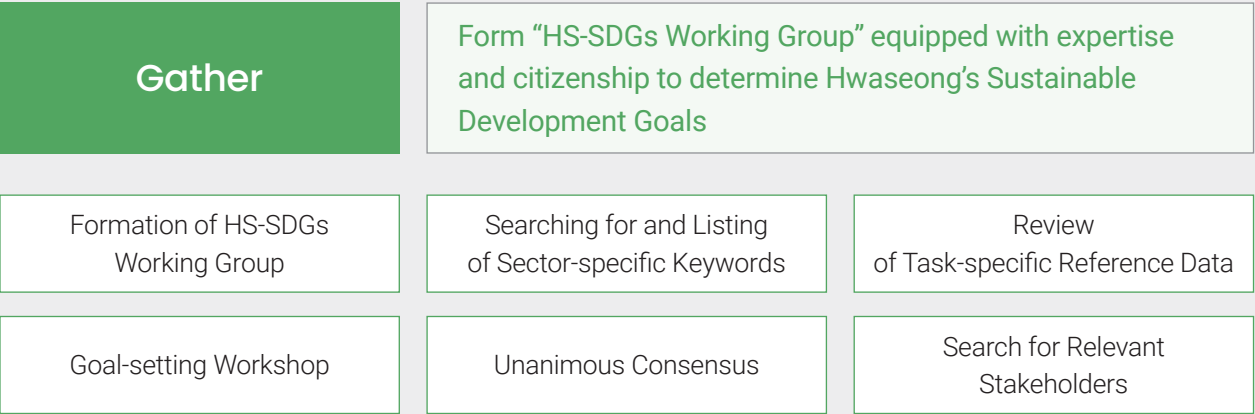


※ Enactment of the Basic Ordinance on Sustainable Development (Jan 2020)

- The discussion forum was held (Sep 2019) to pave the way for Hwaseong's Basic Ordinance on Sustainable Development.
- Sustainable development was established as the core principle in the municipal administration to address sustainability in major policies and plans.
- The legal system improvement and citizen engagement were encouraged to ensure Hwaseong citizens' effective participation in the policy-making process.
- The implementation and planning of the basic sustainability strategies were required.
- The Sustainable Development Committee was formed and operated, and the functions and roles of the Sustainable Development Council were further developed.

※ Formation/Operation of the Sustainable Development Committee (Jan 2020)

- Comprised of about 30 members, the Hwaseong Sustainable Development Committee was formed and operated in accordance with the Basic Ordinance on Sustainable Development.
- The Committee deliberated on matters regarding the basic strategies for sustainable development, creation/changes of implementation plans, and discussed matters necessary to advance with sustainable development policies, including the suggestion of policy recommendations.



※ HS-SDGs Working Group (Nov 2019 ~ Apr 2020)

- The HS-SDGs Working Group was formed and operated as an open forum with the engagement of citizens equipped with expertise and citizenship.
- The working group was comprised of the representatives (from each sector like society, economy and the environment) with expertise and citizenship for sustainable development.
- It set Hwaseong’s vision for the SDGs as well as the directions for sector-specific analysis (the environment, society and economy) and strategies.

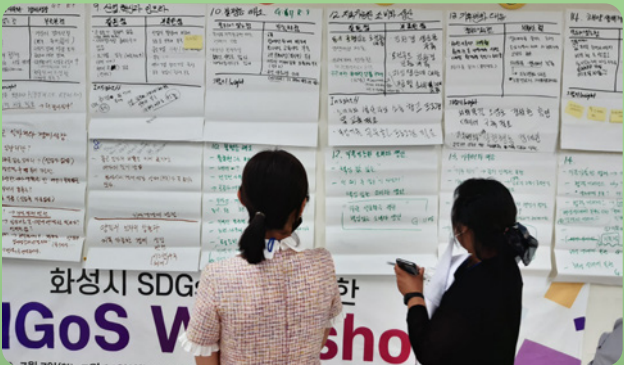

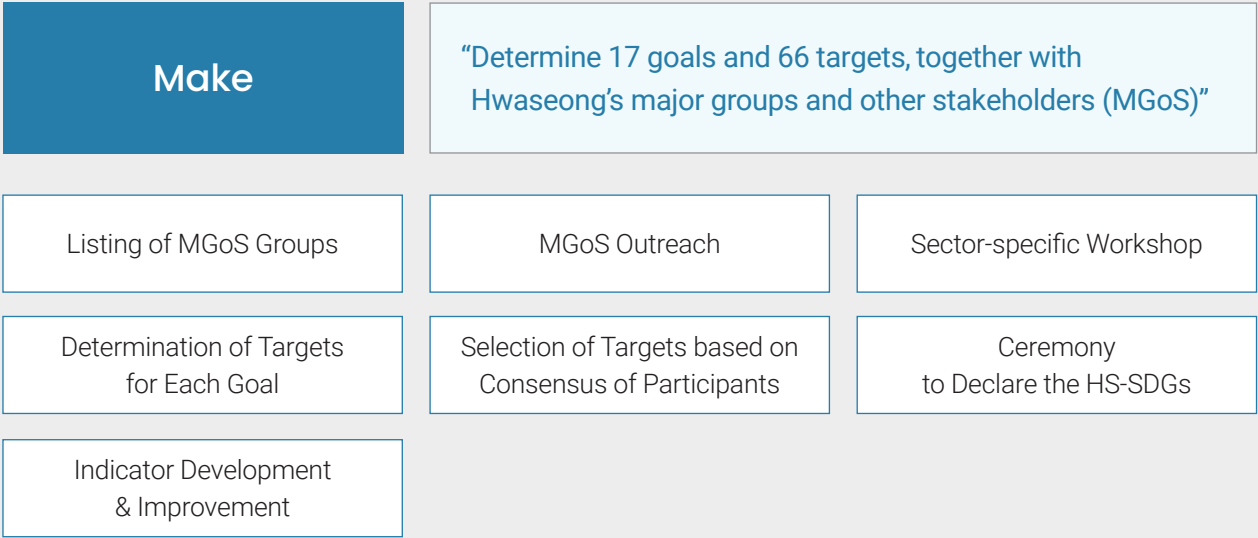

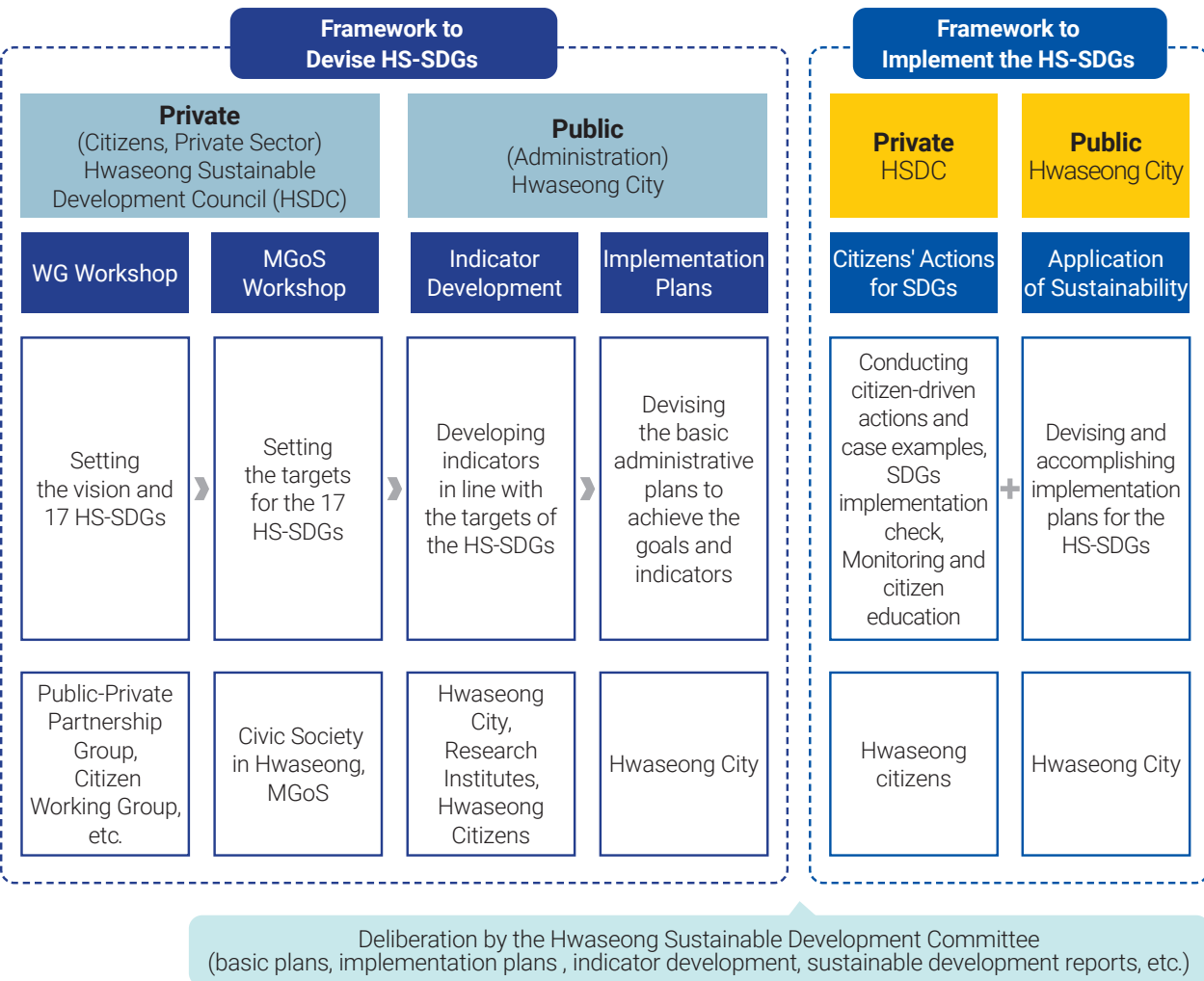

※ The HS-SDGs Declaration Ceremony (Oct 2020)

- Together with citizen representatives, the Mayor of Hwaseong declared the vision to ensure that the HS-SDGs are established as a major direction for the municipal administration and major policies.
- Reporting of the HS-SDGs (environment, society, economy, prerequisite/ methodology) / video report
- Hwaseong's sustainability agreement was signed by MGoS representatives and the Mayor of Hwaseong based on the goals determined by citizens (Hwaseong City, civic groups, enterprises and Hwaseong Sustainable Development Council).
- The membership certificate of the ICLEI - Local Government for Sustainability was granted.



※ Indicator Development for the HS-SDGs (2021 ~ 2023)

- Indicators for the SDGs are tools used to comprehensively evaluate social and environmental sustainability and suggest directions for improvements.
- Hwaseong developed indicators for the HS-SDGs through the core keyword approach, collection of citizens' opinions, and a sustainable management system.

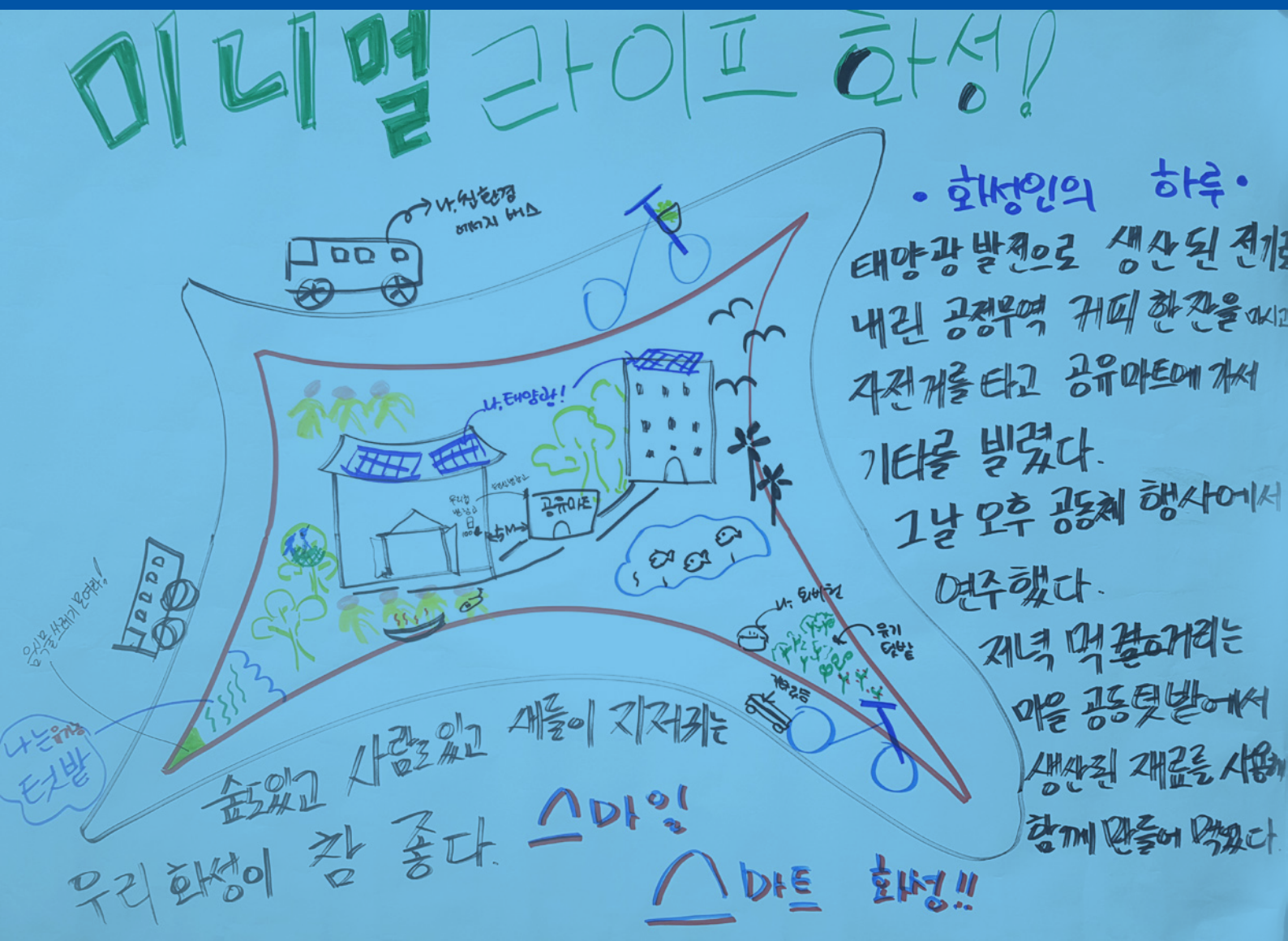
- The characteristics of the indicators can be summarized as their connection to the basic plans, reflection of citizens' opinions, flexibility in responding to changes in urban conditions and provision of visual information to ensure citizens' easy understanding.
- In 2021, 144 indicators were selected, and then based on the 1st and 2nd review and revision, 63 targets and 117 indicators were finalized in 2023.

※ Ecosystem-building for the HS-SDGs

- In the process of devising the HS-SDGs, MGoS workshops and the declaration ceremony were held, expanding groups of stakeholders and listing them in the public and private areas per goal.
- The ecosystem for the HS-SDGs has been completed by arranging stakeholders to the HS-SDGs based on the list.
- The stakeholders involved in the process are also connected through the participation of members of the Hwaseong Sustainable Development Council, local community networking and public-private governance ensuring that they can later put the HS-SDGs into practice.

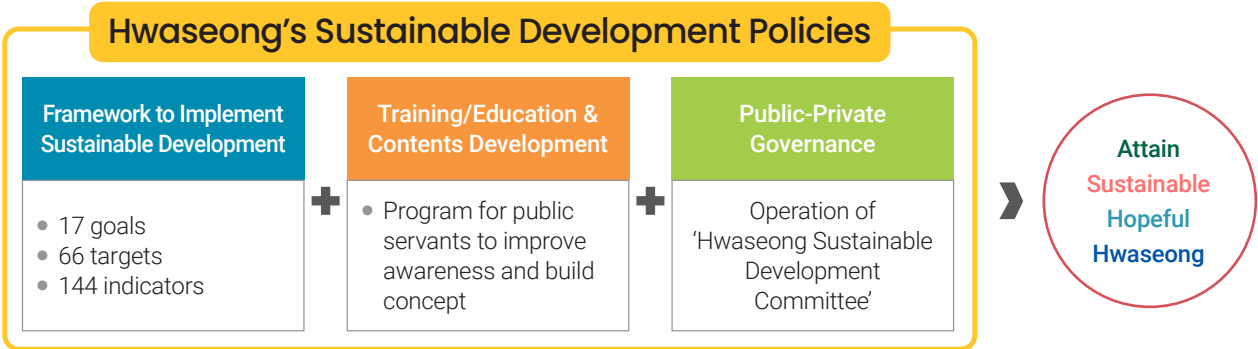
In addition, the city has laid the organizational and institutional groundwork to create a sustainable city through the expansion of citizen engagement and the governance-based municipal administration.

Realization of Sustainable Hwaseong through the Awareness Improvement and Governance



Hwaseong has developed the system that completes the process of planning, implementation/attainment, evaluation and feedback for the HS-SDGs devised under the public-private partnership, in order to establish the sustainable development framework.

Based on the belief that improving the awareness of sustainable development among its internal personnel is essential for reflecting it in policies, the City has also strived to promote capacity-building for employees by continuously operating sustainable development training (brainstorming workshops for sustainable development, the need for SDGs, background and policy reflection).

Additionally, Hwaseong operates 'Hwaseong Sustainable Development Committee,' comprised of the administration, experts and interested parties from each sector, to play a role in suggesting policies, evaluating sustainability and offering deliberation and advice for the efficient implementation of sustainable development.

Hwaseong's Actions for Sustainability of Future Generations



Hwaseong has made Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) as the core value of its municipal administration and actively put them into practice, to ensure a better future for generations to come.

In addition to the city's policies and projects, the voluntary participation and cooperation of civil society have also played a significant role in these efforts, including regional organizations, NGOs, and civic organizations. Citizens have actively engaged in various activities to attain the city's Sustainable Development Goals.

Reinforce the social safety nets to end poverty

Cherishing each and every citizen, Hwaseong has made efforts to create a heart-warming city where no one suffers from poverty. Poverty is a serious issue that goes beyond economic hardship; it damages individuals’ dignity and undermines social development. In this sense, Hwaseong aims to build tightly-knit social safety nets to end poverty and move toward a happy city with no poverty (SDG 1).

The local community’s devoted efforts, making safety nets for children more compact

While the social security nets have been reinforced, there are children who are still waiting for a helping hand. The ‘Mansae Small Library’ has served as a warm boundary by assisting children in welfare blind spots and foreign children through the region’s childcare projects from 2016 to 2021.

The library provides a safe and comfortable place for children to hang out with friends and read various books to nurture their knowledge and imagination. In addition, it operates a Korean language program to help children improve their Korean skills, adjust to school life and actively participate in class. It also discovers children suffering from economic challenges and provides economic assistance needed to maintain their school education in cooperation with relevant organization, helping them to move toward their dreams.

There are many dedicated partners in Hwaseong who are actively supporting healthy growth and dreams of local children. These devoted efforts have contributed to making Hwaseong’s safety nets tighter and creating a safe environment where children can grow up happily.

Hwaseong, a heart-warming city
that grows together with foreign residents



Hwaseong has provided various support programs to help foreign residents enjoy stable settlement and grow together.

The ‘Hwaseong Foreign Welfare Center’ takes the initiative of services tailored to the needs of foreign residents, assisting their adaptation to life in Korea. Customized Korean language training is available at various levels, aiming to help them to improve their Korean language skills and engage in daily life and economic activities without difficulty. Furthermore, it enhances their understanding of Korean culture and lifestyle and supports their independence through employment assistance and legal and life consulting.

The city also makes various efforts to promote welfare of foreign residents and protect their rights, such as the operation of childcare facilities and after-school programs for children of foreign nationals. The Foreign Welfare Center offers comprehensive services for foreign residents, including Korean language courses, cultural adaptation programs, employment support, legal consulting and interpretation, helping them resolve difficulties they might encounter while living in Korea and enabling them to stably settle down.

Hwaseong will continue to listen to the voices of foreign residents, provide the resources they need, and work to create a heart-warming and inclusive city that grows together with them.



HS-SDG 2

Secure a stable food supply
through robust food production
and consumption

Hwaseong aims to provide safe and fresh agricultural products to citizens by expanding eco-friendly agriculture and establishing the local food system. The promotion of urban agriculture encourages citizens to get involved in farming and experience the value of healthy foods. With the introduction of advanced agricultural technologies, the city is also working hard to improve productivity and respond to climate change.

Additionally, Hwaseong has created a culture of healthy diet and sustainable consumption by reducing food wastes and promoting food communities for the marginalized. It has implemented a sustainable food system to secure the health of citizens and food sovereignty.

Taking the lead in production, consumption and circulation of safe food

Hwaseong has made consistent efforts to provide safe and healthy food to its citizens. The 'Hwaseong Basic Food Plan' is the outcome of these efforts. The city has envisioned 'healthy and safe food as the foundation of food welfare for all', strengthening its food policies based on 'Hwaseong Basic Ordinance on Food' formulated in 2021.

Hwaseong also supports eco-friendly farming within the city and expands local food direct sales stores, offering food that citizens can trust. The ingredients used in school meals are strictly managed by the "School Meal Support Center," which conducts thorough pesticide residue testing to ensure safety. Additionally, the city is dedicated to building a sustainable food cycle system through initiatives such as supporting food waste reduction and recycling, promoting urban farming, and offering allotments. In this way, Hwaseong is making multifaceted efforts to ensure safe and healthy food at every stage, from production to consumption and recycling.



Heart-Sharing Meals project, creating a community with warm lunchboxes

The Martian Table (the city's name sounds identical to the Korean word for Mars) is one of the communities in Hwaseong, which takes the initiative in addressing food issues for the vulnerable in the neighborhood through the project called 'Heart-sharing Meals.' Embracing the goal that local residents take action to resolve their own challenges, it provides apartment janitors and cleaners with healthy and warm lunchboxes, fostering an amicable town community.

Through Heart-sharing Meals, the Martian Table not only provides food but also creates opportunities to build relationships and communicate with people from various classes. By doing so, it enhances solidarity among local residents, contributing to a stronger sense of community spirit.

The project also helps to promote the health of the marginalized by sharing nutritious meals, creating positive effects that remind residents of the value of sharing and service.



HS-SDG 3

ReEnhance quality of life throughout the life cycle with target-specific public welfare services

‘A healthy and happy life’ is a fundamental right for all humanity. Hwaseong has established comprehensive health safety nets to ensure that every citizen can benefit from a healthy life, regardless of their income level, place of residence and age. Its welfare policies include medical fee support for vulnerable individuals neglected by health insurance, health management programs tailored to the needs of the disabled, children and the elderly and public medical infrastructure to bridge regional gaps in medial services.

Warm gesture toward the health right of migrants in the blind spots of health insurance



Although health insurance is considered a crucial safety net in our society, unregistered migrants and refugees remain vulnerable to diseases or injuries as they are excluded from insurance benefits. Recognizing this issue, the Gonggam Vocational Environment Medical Center is involved in a project to promote the health right of unregistered migrants and refugees by supporting medical fees.

The Medical Center helps them receive treatment in a timely manner and regain their health through medical fee support. Furthermore, it offers medical fee discounts for out-patient treatment, facilitates connections to tertiary hospitals, when needed, and enhances access to services through advertising and promotion in multiple languages. The Center also strives to enhance the understanding regarding migrants and create non-discriminatory medical environments by providing human rights training for medical personnel.

As a result of these efforts, unregistered migrants and refugees have been able to improve their health and prevent dangerous situations that could lead to serious complications or surgeries through treatment at an early stage. Moreover, this medical support helps them develop a sense of solidarity and belonging to the local community, enabling them to live healthier lives.



HS-SDG 4

Ensure quality education with no one left behind

Education is the key growth engine for personal growth and social development. Hwaseong ensures equal access to quality education opportunities for all citizens, fosters creativity and critical thinking beyond simple delivery of knowledge, and promotes education that nurtures the ability to respect diversity and collaborate with others.

The city aims to provide quality education opportunities to all citizens in an impartial manner. This is not simply about delivering knowledge, but about supporting the growth of citizens through education that fosters creativity, critical thinking, respect for diversity and a sense of community.

Hwaseong taking the lead in spreading ESG values and sustainable development education

Hwaseong has actively engaged in the spread of ESG (environment, society, governance) values and the implementation of the SDGs to evolve into a sustainable city.

Hwaseong provides ESG education for the city's public servants to raise the awareness of ESG in the public administration for a sustainable future. Expert lectures are offered to senior public officials regarding global ESG regulations and the city's roles whereas SDG-integrated training is provided to working-level public servants to strengthen their ESG capacities.

The Hwaseong Sustainable Development Council enhances citizens' understanding of the SDGs through a UNESCO-certified education program called 'One SDG Story After Another.' The program aims to deliver the values of the SDGs in an engaging and fun way, covering all five Ps (People, Planet, Prosperity, Peace and Partnership) while empowering participants to plan and take their own actions. It also offers educational services befitting various groups of participants, including schools, companies and civic organizations, and further expands programs linked with school education to train future generations.

Hwaseong will continue to work toward internalizing the ESG values in its administration and create a sustainable future together with citizens.

Hwaseong as a cultural community heading toward the world



Hwaseong City is a multicultural community where people of various nationalities live together. At the heart of this environment, the Daol Community Center plays a key role in realizing the value of coexistence. The center aims to create an inclusive village community where residents from diverse backgrounds—such as North Korean defectors, multicultural families, migrants, and foreign nationals—can live harmoniously with native citizens. By fostering understanding of cultural diversity and exploring pathways to coexistence, the center promotes equality and integration within the community.

In particular, the center pursues both personal empowerment and community development through adult learning programs. These programs enhance intergenerational communication and understanding, gather diverse perspectives to create local culture, and contribute to the creation of professional job opportunities. To foster "visitable villages" and "participatory villages," the center hosts events such as the Global Culture Village Festival and Our Treasure Market. It also offers various training courses to develop resident instructors, equipping them with the skills to lead and teach within the community.

In this diverse community, residents learn methods of coexistence, explore ways to live together beyond generational, cultural, historical, and religious differences, and work toward developing into a global cultural community. These efforts align with Hwaseong City's governance goal of "Happiness for All" and support its vision of becoming a world-renowned cultural city.

Achieve gender equality by ensuring equal participation and opportunities

Hwaseong strives to build a society where all the citizens can enjoy equal opportunities and realize their potential regardless of gender. To this end, the city deploys policies across various sectors, to expand women's social involvement, support their economic independence, prevent violence against women and assist victims, and improve the awareness of gender equality.

**Hwaseong City Youth:
Opening a Gender-Equal Future with GenderON**

The "Net of Peace Research Institute" has been running the "Youth GenderON" program, designed to enhance gender sensitivity among teenagers. The program aims to empower young people to actively contribute to creating a gender-equal society by fostering their gender awareness and critical thinking.

GenderON provides training on gender sensitivity, teaching participants to recognize and address discriminatory elements in daily life. It also offers education on diverse feminist perspectives, helping youth to shape and articulate their own views. In addition, the program addresses digital sexual violence, covering its types and prevention methods to ensure a safe online environment. Through discussions on queerness and diversity, participants learn to break free from gender stereotypes and cultivate mutual respect.

By enhancing gender sensitivity, GenderON supports teenagers in building healthier relationships and leading freer, more fulfilling lives. Ultimately, the program helps nurture them as active agents in creating a gender-equal society.



HS-SDG 6

**Ensure safe water management
and implement an eco-friendly
water circulation system**

Hwaseong makes its utmost efforts to provide clean and safe water to citizens in a stable manner amid rapidly growing urbanization and industrialization.

Various efforts include the expansion and improvement of waterworks facilities to secure clean water, prevention of water pollution and advancement of wastewater treatment facilities. In addition, the city has established an effective water management system in response to the issue of water scarcity, including the implementation of water re-use systems, utilization of rainwater and management of groundwater.

Working together with citizens to improve the quality of rivers



Hwaseong is cooperating with citizens to make a clean environment for its rivers. For instance, the Hwaseong Federation for Environmental Movement conducts water quality surveys of rivers and streams across Gyeonggi Province, thoroughly investigating the water quality of 78 rivers and streams in Hwaseong and documenting the pollution levels from the upstream to the downstream. Samples collected at some downstream points are sent to specialized organizations for the analysis of water quality.

Based on the survey results, 30 rivers and streams with the worst quality were selected in the southern part of Gyeonggi Province. In 2022, these rivers and streams, including seven located in Hwaseong, were designated as objects of priority control. The survey has contributed to identifying rivers whose improvement of water quality is urgent while also raising citizens' awareness of water quality by accurately diagnosing the current conditions. Furthermore, the city has taken steps to improve water quality by coming up with systematic control measures for those under priority control and securing the budget required for these efforts.



HS-SDG 7

Expand the transition to eco-friendly energy and achieve an energy self-sufficient city

Hwaseong has been active in expanding eco-friendly energy to combat climate change and promote sustainable urban development. For instance, it has expanded renewable energy generation facilities, such as solar and wind energy and increased energy self-sufficiency through the establishment of energy storage systems. The city has also engaged in various efforts, such as improvement of building energy efficiency, energy-saving projects and energy education targeted at citizens, to increase energy efficiency.

Hwaseong provides training to foster energy prosumers, focusing on the fundamental understanding and need of eco-friendly energy as well as actions for energy self-sufficiency. The training is intended to help activities promote the transition to eco-friendly energy in the local community and contribute to establishing the energy system for sustainable management and self-sufficiency.

Along with the programs designed to nurture energy prosumers, the Hwaseong YMCA has also stepped up to help local residents play a key role in energy production and consumption while spreading the culture of eco-friendly energy use. This training provides participants with practical knowledge about energy saving and use of renewable energy and helps them actively engage in self-production and consumption of energy.

Create quality jobs and promote sustainable economic development

Hwaseong City is committed to strengthening the competitiveness of businesses by fostering small and medium-sized enterprises (SMEs), supporting startups, and developing industrial complexes. The city offers various employment support programs tailored to different demographics, ensuring that everyone has the opportunity to work. Customized support is provided for youth, women, and seniors, along with vocational training programs to help individuals develop the skills needed for the future society. Furthermore, Hwaseong City works to protect workers' rights, create safe workplaces, and support a balanced work-life environment.

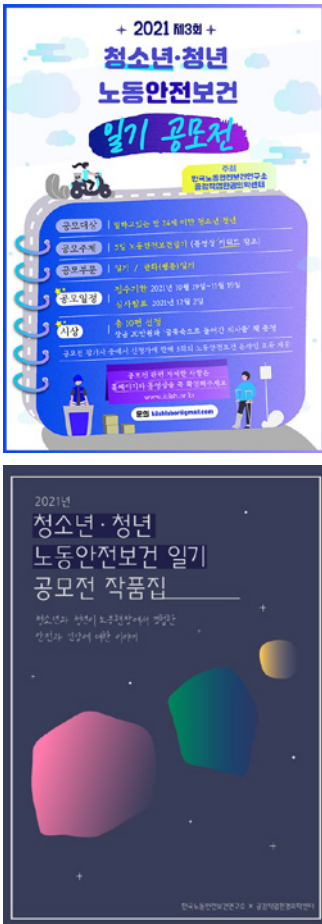
Stories of labor environments told by our young workers

The Gonggam Vocational Environment Medical Center held its 3rd Youth Labor Safety and Health Contest to ensure that the city's adolescents and youth can work in a safe and healthy environment.

The contest provided adolescents and youth with opportunities to share their experiences and think about how to solve their problems by writing labor journals or picture diaries regarding hazards, work-related stress, issues with working hours and occupational accidents while doing part-time work, on-the-job training and at the workplace.

In particular, the contest was intended to highlight the importance of safe working environments while sympathizing with difficulties that youth would experience in their real life, such as long working hours, the lack of rest time and work-related stress.

Going beyond sharing their labor experiences, it served as an opportunity to create a social consensus on the challenges that adolescents and youth face in labor environments and take the first step toward making an improvement. It also reminded many once again of the need for safe and sustainable labor conditions.

Sustainable Development, Spoken by Youth

Through the "Youth Voices Guaranteed Talk Show" project by Cheongcheongdangdang, which conducts youth career mentoring and youth activity projects, the activities of youth groups that participated in the 2020 Korea Sustainable Development Conference's Sustainable Studio were further developed by linking them with the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) and encouraging active youth participation.

To capture the diverse voices of youth, the Blank Talk format was used. The discussions spanned a wide range of topics, including agriculture/food, employment (startups), culture and arts, the environment, gender, education, and media. These discussions were linked to the SDGs, allowing for in-depth conversations based on the direct experiences and concerns of youth in these areas. The content of these discussions was produced into videos and uploaded to a YouTube channel, which helped share the messages with a broader audience and raised social awareness about sustainable development.

Additionally, through the Blank Talk Concert, participants engaged in interesting discussions using items, services, videos, and performances related to their activities. This process facilitated the exchange of ideas and experiences, allowing participants to inspire each other and explore the direction of their activities for sustainable development.

Darkness Musical Performance
with Visually Impaired Participants



To create a society where people with and without disabilities can live together harmoniously, Life Edit Cooperative presents a unique performance, the "Darkness Musical," which is enjoyable for both visually impaired and non-disabled audiences. The Darkness Musical is a new type of performance that relies solely on sound, experienced in complete darkness. This provides visually impaired individuals with a special opportunity to enjoy performing arts, while offering non-disabled audiences a chance to awaken their senses beyond sight and gain a deeper understanding of disability.

The Life Edit Cooperative goes beyond simply allowing visually impaired individuals to watch a performance by recruiting and nurturing visually impaired actors to participate on stage, dedicating efforts to the production of Darkness Musicals. This initiative not only expands cultural and artistic participation for visually impaired individuals but also contributes to job creation. The Darkness Musical, born from this effort, is performed not only as a self-produced show but also in various locations, including Hwaseong City, local governments, welfare centers for people with disabilities, and schools for the blind, touching the hearts of many people.

Hwaseong City is committed to creating a pleasant and safe urban environment. By improving air quality, expanding green spaces, and establishing an eco-friendly transportation system, the city is working to ensure that citizens can live in a healthy and comfortable environment. Additionally, through crime prevention efforts and strengthening disaster response systems, Hwaseong prioritizes citizen safety in its development. Support for multicultural family club gatherings, such as ‘Trong, the Vietnamese traditional percussion’

Hwaseong supports cultural activities for foreign residents in their native languages, enhancing mutual understanding and fostering a sense of community spirit. In particular, at Cultural Togetherness Space Seoro, it has recruited foreign residents interested in their own traditional instrument and provided the ‘Trong’ lessons, the traditional Vietnamese percussion, to spread the value of cultural diversity.

During the ‘Trong’ lessons, participants learn Vietnamese traditional music and have the opportunity to understand each other’s cultures while playing the instrument together. In addition, a regular recital is held to provide citizens with opportunities to exchange ideas, share various cultures and foster harmony. Foreign residents who complete the ‘Trong’ lesson can perform at various occasions, such as

‘Foreign Residents Harmony Festival’, ‘Hwaseong Performance Art Festival’, and ‘Hyangnam-eup Resident Autonomy Festival’, creating opportunities to promote Vietnamese traditional music and engage with local residents.

These multicultural family club gatherings foster cultural empathy among participants and improve the quality of life through expression of their heart. They provide an opportunity for migrants and native residents to recognize multicultural characteristics, respect one another and share their cultures. In addition, it helps identify human resources in the local community, enhance capacities and spread the value of cultural diversity.

Hwaseong City is making various efforts to reduce waste generation and increase recycling rates. The city is promoting policies that maximize the use of recyclable resources and reduce landfill space. The city also supports businesses in producing eco-friendly products and helps consumers make environmentally conscious choices through eco-friendly product certifications, green purchasing support, and environmental education. Clothes revival:
a small action for a sustainable future

In the culture of rapidly changing fast fashion, buying and discarding clothes easily leaves a huge footprint on the environment. Hansalim Western Gyeonggi Cooperative suggests ways to reuse clothes that are no longer worn through its ‘Clothes Revival campaign’, contributing to reducing environmental pollution and fostering a culture of sustainable consumption.

Its online campaign informs people about the impacts that discarded clothes have on the environment, helps people donate their second-hand clothes by placing collection bins at Hansalim stores, and also encourages participation by suggesting ways to donate clothes when ordering a new item.

In front of Hansalim stores in Hwaseong, the Clothes Revival Market took place, granting the new value to garments and items collected. As a result, 5,202 kg of clothes were donated to help build Al-Khair Academy, and the proceeds from the market were delivered to provide local neighbors with daily necessities and groceries.

This ‘Clothes Revival Campaign’ reminds us of the importance of reuse and recycling, highlighting how crucial these small actions are in protecting the environment. It once again tells us that sustainable consumption is the way forward for all of us.



Adolescents in Hwaseong
learning and practicing the value of fair trade

The Haengjin Career Education Cooperative operates the ‘Fair Trade Class for Adolescents’ to teach young people in Hwaseong about the significance of fair trade and ethical consumption. Beyond simply understanding the concept of fair trade, this class offers an opportunity to realize how our purchases can contribute to achieving the SDGs.

In particular, it teaches how fair trade can realize “responsible consumption and production” and helps participants understand the importance of the process where producers are treated fairly and products are produced in consideration of the environment. Through this, we’ve come to realize the products that we purchase are not just for consumption, but represent small actions to attain the SDGs.

The education provided a crucial opportunity where adolescents can learn the value of ethical consumption and ways to put the SDGs into action through fair trade. Based on these experiences, students will spread the culture of sustainable consumption in their daily life. In particular, future generations will also play a key role in making our world fairer and more sustainable.

Let's play at Hwaseong Farmers' Market Farm, where people can share and learn together



As a joint project with the 11th Economic Committee of the Hwaseong Sustainable Development Council, "Let's Play at Farmers' Market Farm" is an event led by activists from Hwaseong's Economic Committee to offer a crucial opportunity for local residents to learn and practice sustainable consumption and production.

Participants shared various foods made from fresh agricultural produce cultivated in Hwaseong and experienced the value of locally produced goods. The event also served as an opportunity for participants to recognize the importance of ethical consumption while sharing food, and to develop consumption habitats that consider the environment by practicing zero wastes.

Especially, participants got rid of disposable products by bringing their own tumblers and plates to enjoy food, actively contributing to environmental protection. Furthermore, they had the opportunity to experience sustainable consumption by using plastic lids instead of paying an admission fee.

The event was not just a sales event but a chance for people to practice a consumption culture in consideration of the environment and social responsibilities through locally-grown agricultural produce and zero-waste activities. It was indeed a crucial time for participants to recognize the value of sustainable life and put it into practice.

Hwaseong City is establishing a Carbon Neutrality Basic Plan as a strong institutional measure to reduce greenhouse gas emissions. The city is promoting policies to improve energy efficiency and expand the use of renewable energy, while encouraging citizen participation in reducing carbon emissions. Additionally, Hwaseong is making various efforts to minimize the damage caused by climate change. The city is building urban infrastructure to prepare for extreme weather events such as heatwaves, heavy rain, and droughts, while strengthening education and awareness campaigns to enhance citizens' safety consciousness.

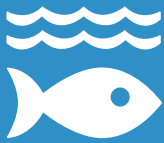

‘Our Neighborhood Factory Map’, leading the efforts to ensure the right to know and solve environmental issues



Hwaseong conducted an activity called “Our Neighborhood Factory Map” to conduct a fact-finding survey on local workplaces with frequent civil complaints. It is intended to pinpoint any hazardous substances emitted by factories and industrial facilities in Hwaseong and assess the impacts on the health of local residents. Based on the findings, the “Our Neighborhood Factory Map” was created to provide residents with easy access to the accurate information.

The Hwaseong Council for Citizens’ Right to Know Chemicals has paved the way to alleviate vague fear by informing local residents of what is being produced in neighboring factories and address the issues that have to be tackled in a practical manner. It encourages residents to collectively focus on the surrounding environments, organizes gatherings and forums with companies in the nearby industrial complexes and provides communication channels and clues for problem-solving.

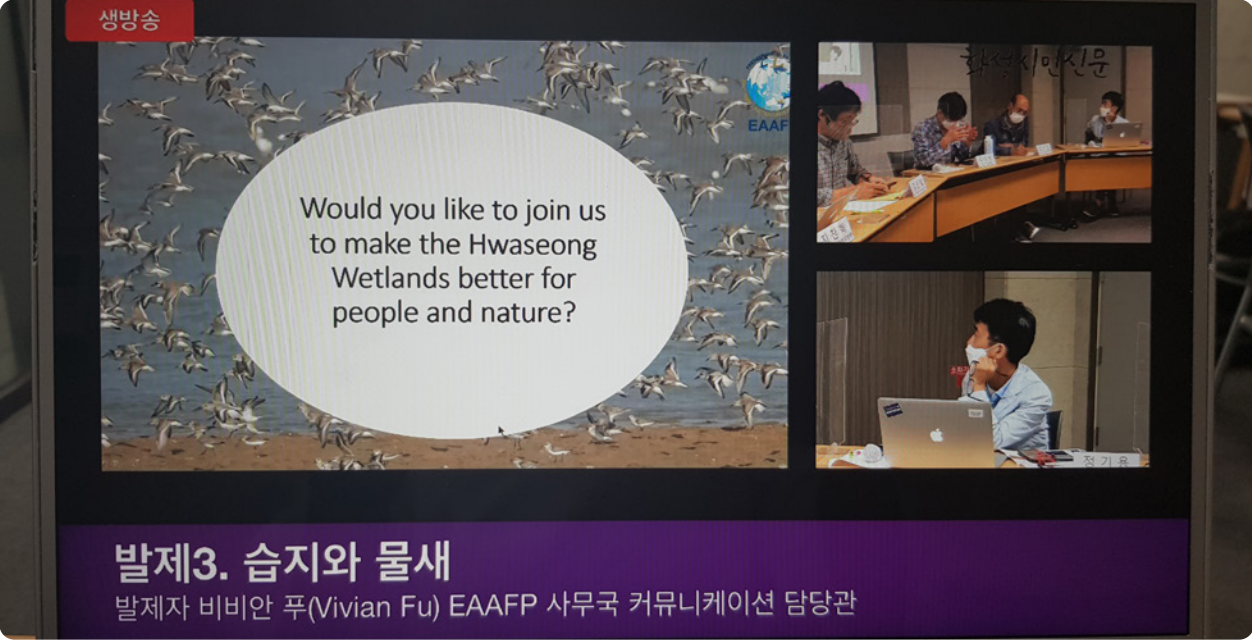

Hwaseong City is making various efforts to pass down its rich marine ecosystems, such as the Maehyangri tidal flats and Hwaseong Lake, to future generations. The Maehyangri tidal flats, once damaged, have regained vitality through ecological restoration, and Hwaseong Lake is being protected as a safe habitat for migratory birds. To ensure a clean sea, the city supports marine litter collection activities and the retrieval of abandoned fishing gear, while also running campaigns and educational programs to encourage citizen participation.

Conservation of Hwaseong wetlands

There are many wetlands in Hwaseong. The city made efforts to designate Maehyang Tidal Flats as a protected wetland area, by raising the awareness among local residents and citizens and building the public-private governance. It conducted a signature-collecting campaign to urge the designation of Maehyang Tidal Flats as a protected wetland area, along with a press conference. It also hosted an online celebration event for citizens to commemorate the designation. Furthermore, a forum was held to discuss the potential designation of the inner section of Hwaseong Wetlands as a protected area. As a result, on July 21, 2021, Maehyang Tidal Flats were designated as a protected wetland area.

Coexistence of Migratory Birds and Humans:
Hwaseong Wetlands International Symposium

To preserve the Hwaseong Wetlands, a treasure trove of biodiversity with high ecological value, and explore sustainable usage strategies, Hwaseong City hosted an international symposium from 2019 to 2021.

The first symposium, held in May 2019 under the theme "Hwaseong Wetlands: Connecting Sky, Sea, and Life, Painting Hope," brought together domestic and international experts, NGOs, and citizens to share successful wetland conservation cases and discuss ways to manage wetlands in collaboration with local communities. A key highlight was the Hwaseong Wetland bird-watching program, which offered participants a direct experience of the wetland's biodiversity.

In December 2020, due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the symposium shifted online with the theme "Hwaseong Wetlands: The Center of the East Asia-Australasia Flyway Network." In collaboration with the East Asia-Australasia Flyway Partnership (EAAFP)

Secretariat, the symposium reevaluated the conservation value of the Hwaseong Wetlands and explored international cooperation strategies to protect migratory bird routes.

The second symposium, held in November 2021 under the theme "Embracing Wetlands, Connecting Hwaseong, Opening the Future," celebrated the designation of Maehyangri Tidal Flats as a protected wetland area. The event focused on conservation and management strategies for Hwaseong Wetlands, as well as citizen involvement in wetland protection efforts.

Over three years, these symposiums raised the international profile of the Hwaseong Wetlands, strengthened domestic and international networks for wetland conservation, expanded citizen participation, and laid the groundwork for the sustainable preservation of the wetlands.

Hwaseong City is committed to protecting and restoring valuable terrestrial ecosystems, such as forests, wetlands, and rivers, which are home to diverse species. The city is working to restore damaged ecosystems, connect habitats, and eliminate invasive species to preserve biodiversity. To allow citizens to enjoy living in harmony with nature, Hwaseong has developed ecological parks, forest trails, and nature learning centers. The city also offers various ecological education programs to promote awareness and appreciation of the natural environment.

Hwaseong fostering citizens' ecological sensitivity through exploration of the biodiversity in urban forests

Hwaseong City is making various efforts to share the value of its forests and biodiversity with its citizens and raise ecological sensitivity. The Hwaseong City Sustainable Development Council organizes the "Hwaseong Urban Forest Biodiversity Exploration," which plays a crucial role as a citizen-participation-based ecological education program.

In this exploration, general citizens, ecological experts, and local environmental organizations participate together. Participants choose areas of interest and collaborate with experts and environmental groups to conduct species surveys and participate in on-site education. By directly observing and experiencing the process, participants gain a deeper understanding of the importance of biodiversity. The survey results, including a species list, are compiled and used as educational materials for future ecological programs. Through this initiative, Hwaseong City is raising awareness about the ecological and environmental value of urban forests - green spaces within the city - and contributing to the creation of a sustainable urban environment for future generations.

Hwaseong City is fostering a transparent and democratic society by listening to citizens' voices and expanding public participation through open administration. The city provides various channels for citizens to participate in the policy-making process, actively collecting their opinions and reflecting them in policies, thus ensuring citizens' rights and increasing social participation. Additionally, to prevent corruption, Hwaseong has established a transparent and efficient administrative system and is working to create a clean and trustworthy society through fair and strict law enforcement.

Operating a program to foster lecturers for the education of teenager human rights as the first step toward the future

The Mesh Peace Institute operates the 'program to foster instructors who teach labor rights to adolescents,' with the aim to protect and promote teenagers' labor rights. It is intended to raise the social awareness about labor rights of adolescents and produce specialized instructors responsible for practical education in the field.

The instructors teaching labor rights education help adolescents, new to the labor market, understand their basic rights as workers and acquire knowledge and practical skills needed to protect them. In addition, they directly contribute to laying the groundwork to labor rights education for adolescents, enhancing the effectiveness of the education and protecting the rights of the local community and adolescents. This, in turn, leads to healthy growth and positive effects, such as the improved labor conditions and changes in social perception.

Hwaseong City is dedicated to collaborating with various partners with an open mind, sharing knowledge and experiences, and growing together. Shihwa Lake 30 Years: A New Commitment from Citizens



Shihwa Lake, an artificial sea lake spanning Hwaseong, Ansan, and Siheung in Gyeonggi Province, was originally created to secure agricultural water, but it became heavily polluted with industrial wastewater and household sewage, earning the nickname "the lake of death." The government abandoned plans for freshwater restoration and began circulating seawater, ultimately deciding to construct a tidal power plant in 2002. Over the past 30 years, with electricity production starting in 2011, Shihwa Lake has transformed into an ecological haven, becoming a vital stop for migratory birds, thanks to the recovery of its ecosystem. This transformation is the result of joint efforts from citizens, the government, local municipalities, and the community.

The citizens' determination to improve the environment led to the formation of environmental organizations and the establishment of specialized institutions. Citizens' groups from Hwaseong, Ansan, and Siheung gathered around the Sustainable Development Council (Hwaseong, Ansan, and Siheung) and carried out various activities, including the Shihwa Lake Conference and Youth Literary

Camps. In 2013, they jointly announced the "Shihwa Lake Basin Agenda and Action Plan," taking the lead in revitalizing the lake. Citizen participation and cooperation were key driving forces in the lake's recovery.

In 2024, marking the 30th anniversary of Shihwa Lake's creation and the 10th anniversary of the Shihwa Lake Basin Agenda and Action Plan, the Hwaseong, Ansan, and Siheung Sustainability Council has united once again. Through initiatives such as the Shihwa Lake Citizen Awareness Survey, Hwaseong, Ansan, Siheung Shihwa Lake Joint Action Workshop, and Shihwa Lake Special Session, the voices of citizens were heard, and practical action items for the future were identified, providing new momentum for the improvement of the lake's environment. This is an important process of reflecting on the past 30 years and preparing for the next decade, marking the beginning of a new step forward, revisiting past collaborations, and working together toward the future.

Closing Remarks

The 2024 Hwaseong City Voluntary Local Review (VLR) Report is centered around the deliberative process in which citizens and the local administration collaborated to establish the city's Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). Along with this, the report outlines the process of formulating key policies in line with the SDGs, the directions for achieving these goals, and includes specific citizen-led initiatives from Hwaseong City, which are shared globally.

Hwaseong City is committed to continuing this global policy-sharing process. The city plans to publish a Sustainable Development Report in the future, which will evaluate the implementation of the SDGs and track progress.

The upcoming Hwaseong City Sustainable Development Report will be a crucial document, developed in accordance with the Sustainable Development Basic Act and the Hwaseong City Sustainable Development Ordinance. It will assess the city's current efforts and propose future development directions, serving as an important resource for advancing sustainable development.

Not only will the Voluntary Local Review Report contribute to improving the quality of life for citizens, but the future Hwaseong City Sustainable Development Report will also focus on creating a sustainable Hwaseong. By fostering citizen participation and collaboration, the city aims to strengthen its sustainable

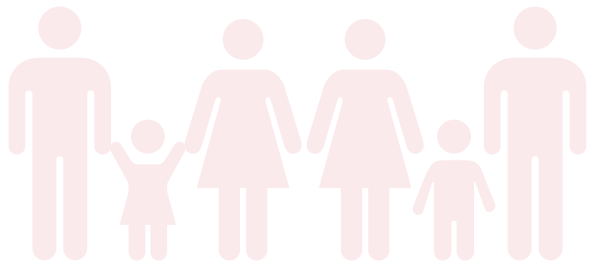
development policies and contribute to the UN's SDG goals, serving as an exemplary city in the pursuit of a sustainable future.

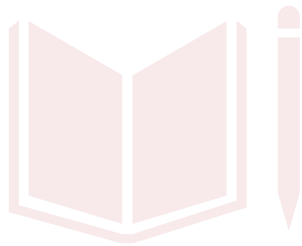

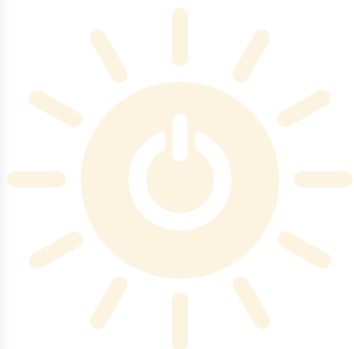
